



# The Home Ignition Zone

**Free Defensible Space Webinar  
2:00 pm on Thursday October 15, 2020**

This webinar is the first of a three-part series discussing ways to reduce your homes risk to wildland fire.

“The Home Ignition Zone,” will focus on ways homeowners can reduce wildfire risk by creating defensible space in the area immediately around the home, with a particular focus on the area within five-feet around the home’s exterior. This area is where the house is most vulnerable to radiant heat, embers and direct flame contact (RED).

In this webinar, after a one-hour presentation, we will spend about 30 minutes in a question and answer format discussing what people can and should do in the Home Ignition Zone. We are limited to 100 attendees so please register early!
